What is nlaad?

NLAAD 2010 Objectives

Increase the knowledge of HIV/AIDS in high-risk Latino/Hispanic communities, including lesbian, gay, bisexual, transgender (LGBT) individuals, men who have sex with men (MSM), immigrants, substance users, women and youth; and promoting culturally relevant HIV testing and prevention initiatives.



Estimated number of Hispanic/Latinos who have died of AIDS by the end of 2007 in the U.S.




Number of Hispanic/Latinos living with HIV/AIDS in the 34 states with long-term confidential name-based HIV reporting Every year, since 2003, the Latino Commission on AIDS partners with local, regional, and national organizations to mobilize a broad and farreaching consortium of community based organizations, leaders from the Latino community, city and state health departments, and elected officials. Through press conferences, health fairs, cultural celebrations, and other activities, Latinos/Hispanics around the country recognize the tremendous toll HIV has taken on their local and national communities and the importance of prevention and care through HIV testing. The principle theme of NLAAD has been the promotion of HIV testing for the Latino/Hispanic community. Every jurisdiction organizes and initiates activities for HIV testing, as well as activities addressing other important community-specific HIV/AIDS issues.



NLAAD provides local Latino/Hispanic AIDS organizations and organizations that serve Latinos with an important opportunity to bring attention to the conditions which facilitate the spread of HIV in their communities and the struggles faced by Latinos/Hispanics living with HIV/AIDS.






Four in ten Latinos/Hispanic were diagnosed with AIDS 1 year within after testing positive for HIV.

Impact of Hiviaids on Latino/Hispanic Communities:

Latinos/Hispanics are now the largest minority groups in the U.S. and continue to grow at exponential rates. The HIV/AIDS epidemic has adversely affected Hispanic/Latino communities. Therefore it is imperative to understand and address the impact of HIV/AIDS on the Latino/Hispanic community today in order to ensure a better tomorrow

Facts:

- Latinos/Hispanics represent 16% of the population but account for 18.0% of people living with HIV and are now reported to be 20% of new infections.
- Testing is the essential first step in linking people with HIV to medical care and ongoing support to help them establish and maintain safer behaviors.
- CDC data shows that Latinos/Hispanics progress to AIDS faster than any other racial or ethnic group with 42% being diagnosed with AIDS within 12 months after learning of their positive HIV status.







- Latino/Hispanic men who have sex with men (MSM) continue to account for the largest number of Latinos reported with AIDS each year
- Culturally appropriate health education in our schools regarding HIV/AIDS is needed
- Over 50% of Latino/Hispanic that are HIV positive status end up developing AIDS within a year. HIV testing is imperative in order to keep our Latino/Hispanic communities healthy
- Homophobia continues to persist. Persons may believe HIV/AIDS is only a gay disease and do not see themselves at risk
- For many Latino mothers, personal health is not considered as high a priority as the health of their family
- Latino youth represents 23% of the national population, yet comprise 19% of new HIV cases
- Some Hispanics/ Latinos may avoid seeking testing, counseling, or treatment if infected out of fear of discrimination
- Socioeconomic factors such as poverty, migration patterns, social structures, or language barriers add to Hispanic/ Latino HIV infection rates
- 30% of Latinos/Hispanics are uninsured

The deep south:

Latinos are now in states that historically have not had large Latino/ Hispanic concentrations. The Latino Commission on AIDS is tackling the HIV/AIDS epidemic in the south through Latinos in the Deep South, www.latinoaids.org/programs/deepsouth/

Estimated number of persons tested for HIV at NLAAD events in 2010 – the largest number of individuals tested since the inception of NLAAD in 2003 In 2010, the Latino Commission mobilized more than 450 organizations, in over 200 cities, from 45 States throughout the U.S. including the District of Columbia, Puerto Rico and the U.S. Virgin Islands under the theme **Save a Life, It may be your Own. Get tested for HIV** (Salva una Vida, Podría ser la Tuya. Hazte la prueba del VIH). Through a partnership with OraSure Technologies, 7,000 HIV testing kits were donated to NLAAD partners that were CLIA waived HIV testing certified sites, thus providing counseling and testing services to thousands of Latinos/Hispanics and making tens of thousands more aware of the challenges faced by Latinos/Hispanics in confronting the HIV/AIDS crisis in their local communities. Across the country, NLAAD has become an organizing mechanism that serves as a catalyst beyond October 15th and stays in place for the whole year. Some examples include the Metropolitan Latino AIDS Coalition (MLAC), the Bay Area National Latino AIDS Awareness Day (BANLAAD), the Los Angeles-NLAAD coalition, and the Community Cooperative Council on HIV/AIDS Prevention in Minnesota.

These NLAAD coalitions are unique in how our national planning committee has been able to increase the capacity of these organizations. Comprised of community-based organizations different capacities in many major cities, these NLAAD coalitions or committees, take NLAAD's messages and images, tailor them to their communities and convert NLAAD into a very unique community experience. The key to these organizations' success has been their ability to share expertise, knowledge, and resources. NLAAD, through the Latino Commission provides them with the building blocks of the campaign and they in turn tailor it to meet their local needs.



In addition to serving as an organizing mechanism where coalitions are built and become standing bodies that coordinate year-round AIDS awareness activities (i.e. testing, community outreach, etc.), fostering partnerships with key national organizations and bodies such as the Congressional Hispanic Caucus, the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, the Awareness Days Cross Coordination Group, the National Alliance of State and Territorial AIDS Directors, and with the Kaiser Family Foundation and Univision, have elevated NLAAD's presence on both a national and local level and as a result support from additional entities has been secured.

CONGRESSIONAL HISPANIC CAUCUS (CHC):


The CHC has supported and sponsored NLAAD's Congressional Briefings since 2006. The CHC officially endorses NLAAD every year by issuing a resolution on the house floor and, disseminating an official statement and press release in support of NLAAD. This support is essential to spread NLAAD's message to other elected officials and key policy makers. **REACHING LATINOS THROUGH MEDIA –** Organized by WestSide Neighborhood Clinic in Santa Barbara, California KIST-FM Radio Bronco 107.7 promotes NLAAD.



NATIONAL ALLIANCE OF STATE AND TERRITORIAL AIDS DIRECTORS (NASTAD):

NASTAD represents the nation's chief state health agency staff who have programmatic responsibility for administering HIV/AIDS healthcare, prevention, education, and supportive service programs funded by state and federal governments. By solidifying a partnership between NLAAD and NASTAD, the level and the number of health departments involved in planning or funding NLAAD activities has increased year over year.

- 2007: 26 Health Departments participated in NLAAD
- 2008: 59 Health Departments participated in NLAAD
- 2009: 66 Health Departments participated in NLAAD
- 2010: 72 Health Departments participated in NLAAD



AWARENESS DAYS CROSS COORDINATION GROUP:

This AIDS Awareness Days Cross Coordination group began in 2006 with the leadership of AIDS.gov. NLAAD has been a member of this group since 2006 and currently, the NLAAD director is part of the leadership transition team that is developing methods by which all national awareness day leads will continue to share best practices, lessons learned, key resources, and evaluation tools for implementing national awareness day activities.

WASHINGTON DC BRIEFING:

Prior to NLAAD, on September 23rd, a Congressional Briefing is held on Capitol Hill in collaboration with the National Alliance of State and Territorial HIV/AIDS Directors (NASTAD), the Metropolitan Latino AIDS Coalition of Washington DC, the Congressional Hispanic

EDUCATING CONGRESS - Congressional Briefing, supported by Congresswomen Ileana Ros-Lehtinen, Lucille Roybal-Allard and community partners in Washington D.C. Caucus, the Hispanic Federation and National Hispanic/Latino AIDS Action Network (NLAAN) and representatives from both parties: Congresswoman Ros-Lehtinen and Congresswoman Roybal-Allard. The briefing emphasized the impact health care reform will have on the Latino HIV/AIDS community and focused on the important role the US Census plays in ensuring that Latinos are no longer undercounted, that adequate funding is provided for programs that impact Latinos and stressed the need to ensure that Latinos complete the census survey.

Soy...("I Am...") A Public Service Campaign:

In conjunction with National Latino AIDS Awareness Day, Univision and the Kaiser Family Foundation launched SOY... ("I am..."); an innovative public health campaign, which seeks to confront stigma and debunk myths about HIV by encouraging Latinos to talk openly about AIDS. This campaign was debuted nationally on October 15, 2008 and was the first Spanish-language media campaign featuring the personal stories of a diverse group of Latinos living with HIV and the people who love them. A new series of **SOY**...PSA's were developed for 2010 and were also available to all national Univision affiliates in key Latino markets (Miami, Los Angeles, New York).

Percentage of people who tested positive to HIV in the reported NLAAD events. **EXECUTIVE SUMMARY** In order to improve upon the NLAAD campaign of 2010 and to assess the immediate effectiveness of NLAAD as a public health media campaign designed to increase awareness and encourage testing behaviors, we conducted three evaluation activities:

- 1. online survey for event organizers to gather information on activities, testing events, and participant demographics;
- street intercepts in the cities of Atlanta, Charlotte, NC, New York City, North Charleston, SC, Rock Hill, SC, Santa Fe, NM, and Washington, DC with the general Latino public a week before and after NLAAD; and
- 3. a media contextual/citation analysis. In summary, the evaluation effort included the perspective of 2010 event organizers, media, and the general Latino public.

2010 EVENTS:

There were a total of 135 Web survey respondents representing 32 states, the US Virgin Islands and Washington DC. Across all the survey respondents that held an event, there were 273 NLAAD events reported. Although October 15 is designated as the National Latino AIDS Awareness Day, organizations and individuals may conduct their events before or after October 15. Of the total 135 survey respondents, 124 hosted an NLAAD event. Of these respondents, 55% held their event(s) on October 15; 29% held their event(s) before October 15; and 16% held their event(s) after October 15. A majority of the respondents (78%) reported holding an HIV screening event. Of those that held an HIV testing event, the most commonly used method for testing was the oral rapid (48%). For 26% of the respondents, 2010 was the first time hosting an NLAAD event. 59% of respondents who hosted an event in 2010 held either one or two events. More than half (58%) of the respondents reported having a planning and organizing committee for NLAAD.


In 2010, survey respondents who held an NLAAD event reported that a total of 77 people tested as positive for HIV out of a reported total of 2665 people tested at the events. Thus, taking into account only those that completed the survey and reported their event activities, there was a 3% positivity rate for those tested at an NLAAD testing events. Of the respondents, a majority (62%) specifically target Hispanics/Latinos throughout the year. Thus, 38% of the respondents do not necessarily target Latinos throughout the year and NLAAD affords them perhaps an opportunity to reach a new population. In respect to gender and sexuality, 22% of respondents noted that over 50% of the individuals tested at their events were men who have sex with men (MSM). Furthermore, 88% of respondents reported that heterosexual women comprised a portion of the population their agency tested during NLAAD. In terms of people actually tested, 50% of respondents who held a testing event noted that over 50% of the people they tested were Hispanic/Latino. Eighty percent of respondents who hosted an HIV screening event reported African-Americans as a population that also tested at their NLAAD event. In terms of age, more than 30% of respondents noted that people who tested were between 19 years old and 25 years old.

Event holders were asked what advertising mediums they utilized to recruit for their NLAAD event, whether via their Web site or the NLAAD Web site; radio; TV or newspaper ads; health fairs; flyers; or other methods. Seventy-nine percent reported using at least 1 form of advertising; with a plurality (22%) reporting the use of three mediums. The most used form of advertising was flyers; 64% of respondents reported employing this method in 2010. Also used for advertising were health fairs (35%), the agency's own Web site (35%), and NLAAD's website (35%). In terms of the campaign kit assembled by the Commission, a plurality (42%) reported having first heard of the NLAAD campaign kit via the NLAAD Web site.

AWARENESS AMONGST GENERAL PUBLIC: The street intercepts were conducted before (from October 3 through October 14) and after (from October 21 to November 11) the October 15th Awareness Day. A total of 340 pre-NLAAD street intercepts and 290 post-NLAAD street intercept surveys were collected by a total of 56 street interceptors. North Charleston, SC had the most interviewers. Of the total 630 surveys, 75.5% were completed in Spanish, and the rest in English. There were differences in ethnic identification across the cities: while in most of the cities at least 91% of respondents identified as Hispanic/Latino, in Rock Hill, SC only 74% responded that way, and in Santa Fe, NM only 44% identified as Hispanic/Latino. When asked about race, the largest group (45.2%) self-identified as "Other". A total of 134 actions were reported as a result of the campaign, with the most frequent being taking an HIV test (n=45); 30% of those aware of the NLAAD went and got tested.

MEDIA COVERAGE:

The Latino Commission on AIDS partnered collected (through Google alerts and other search methods) and coded 123 media articles on NLAAD. The dates of the articles ranged from June 8, 2010 to December 16, 2010; with 52% before NLAAD, 11% after NLAAD, and 37% on October 15th. Close to 89% of the articles were in English and the others were in Spanish. In terms of publication type, 79% were webbased. The articles that were not web-based publications, were from 11 states and the District of Columbia. Across all articles, 81% were



directed at the general audience, whereas 11% were directed at Hispanic/Latinos. A larger percentage (39%) of the articles came from the mid-atlantic region. In regards to the article headlines, 68% were noting the occurrence of NLAAD, while 9% noted data regarding HIV, Latinos etc. Only 20% of the articles mentioned the Latino Commission on AIDS, while 18% mentioned the NLAAD website. Over 71% of the articles mentioned HIV testing, while 20% mentioned HIV treatment or research.

Overall, NLAAD 2010 was very successful: it reached a good percentage of the general Latino public; it fostered collaboration amongst community-based organizations; it not only has encouraged Latinos to get tested for HIV but also were able to get identify new positives; and it helped build the capacity of organizations to create their own press releases.
